Parents, gamers beware

Game ratings may not deter children, violence of games up, says expert

WHEN it comes to video games, having ratings to protect the young and impressionable from their violent content may not make much of a difference.

In fact, American expert Dr Douglas Gentile believes that tagging such games with the “mature” label would only make children — who make up a large number of video game addicts — actively seek out the “forbidden fruit”.

Speaking to reporters, Dr Gentile, who runs the Media Research Lab at Iowa State University in the United States, said: “In general, there is a lack of validity for the ratings of video games,”

“Even the cartoonish of games are just as violent as the photorealistic ones ... and in my studies, we see that every gamer seems to be affected (even) in the short-term,” said the assistant professor of the university’s department of psychology.

He was speaking on the sidelines of a seminar, Online Gaming Addiction and Counselling Pathological Gamers. Organised by Touch Cyber Wellness and Sports (TC&S), the event was attended by some 70 educators, counsellors and social workers. It was aimed at helping them to prepare better in the face of increasing demand for counselling “pathological” gamers.

Cyber gamers, especially those who take part in massively multiplayer online role-playing games, are usually teenagers who often spend more than two hours online.

A number of studies involving 37,000 people around the world have shown that playing violent games may contribute to real-life aggressive behaviour.

Research has also shown that just over one in five gamers said that they preferred

MORE SEEK HELP

More parents in Singapore are seeking help to cope with their children’s gaming habits, said TC&S manager Poh Yeang Cheng.

Last year, 8,000 parents attended workshops on video gaming to find out more about gaming addiction. The figure represented a three-fold increase from the previous year.

In 2006, the organisation handled 145 cases of gaming addicts who needed counselling. Between that year and last year, there was a 65 per cent increase in the number of counselling cases.

Last year alone, TC&S received 200 enquiries from parents about gaming addiction. Out of this, some 40 cases were put to the attention of counsellors.

socialising and chatting online to offline.

With images now near photorealistic, said Dr Gentile, some video games have also enhanced the violence quotient to the point that some “games glorify psychopathic tendencies”.

When children who are addicted to these games start to associate aggression with fun, it might desensitise them and eventually have a significant impact on the gamers’ personalities.

For example, some games focus on being vigilant against one’s enemies.

“Then, when you are walking down your school hallway, and you get bumped by another kid, instead of assuming it was an accident, you assume that this had hostile intent and that the other kid meant to make you mad,” Dr Gentile said.

The concern for gaming addiction has been growing around the world. Some countries, such as South Korea, China, and the United States, have responded by opening treatment centres.

Ultimately, said Dr Gentile, parent involvement is needed to address gaming addiction because “when parents do set limits, then there is a powerful limit factor”.
